· Categories of Submission

Analytical Essays

Word Limit: 1500–2000 words

Comprehensive research and detailed analysis of legal or policy issues.

Case Comments / Legislative Notes

Word Limit: 1200–1500 words

Focused and concise examination of judicial decisions or legislative developments.

Opinion Pieces

Word Limit: 800–1200 words

Short, persuasive, and well-reasoned reflections on contemporary legal concerns.

· Submission Guidelines

To maintain academic integrity and publication quality, authors are requested to comply with the following guidelines:

Originality

- Submissions must be original and unpublished.
- Simultaneous submissions under active review elsewhere should be disclosed.
- A plagiarism report (Turnitin or equivalent) must accompany the submission.
- The similarity index must not exceed **15%** (excluding references and properly cited quotations).

Formatting Requirements

- Font: **Times New Roman**
- Font Size: **12**
- Line Spacing: **1.5**
- Paragraph Spacing: **6 pt before and after**

Citation Style

- References should preferably be incorporated through **hyperlinks embedded within the text**.
- Endnotes may be used where hyperlinks are unavailable or unsuitable.
- Citations must follow the **Bluebook (22nd Edition)** style.
- Endnotes should be in **Times New Roman, Font Size 10, Single Spacing**.

Headings and Title Format

- The title must be **bold and underlined**, written in **sentence case**.
- Heading 2 should be **bold**.
- Heading 3 should be **underlined**.
